

Elite cyclists could soon be riding to the Golden Jubilee to see if they can gain a competitive edge in the race for gold medals.

esearchers using our Motion Analysis Laboratory are in the set-up phase of a study which could give racers a helping hand onto the winner's podium.

When it gets on the road, our research could determine if the length of bicycle cranks are pivotal in cyclists' search for glory.

Using advanced 3D technology with infrared digital cameras, cyclists will ride on a static bike while sensors on their body pick up their real-time movements.

Participants in the study will see a real-time computer generated version of their own body going through rigorous exercise – showing specific pressure points on the joints, ankles and hips.

We will be looking at varying crank length in terms of the power that a cyclist can produce for 20 minutes in an aero dynamic time trial position.

"There's some anecdotal evidence to suggest that a shorter crank might allow you to put out more power over a given time period in a time trial position.

"We're going to get cyclists going flat out for 20 minutes with one length of crank and do the same test a few days later with either a shorter or longer crank to see what impact that has on their power output."

This research is cutting edge and we believe it is the first of its kind.

"The test will allow us to capture really interesting information about angles and how the crank length could affect your position on a bike, as well as your power output.

"We'd be delighted to hear from cyclists who may want to get involved in the study."

BBC records two features for Inside Health programme

We've had great interest this year from the BBC who sent a team up to record a couple of features for Radio 4.



Visiting the hospital recently was Glasgow GP Dr Margaret McCartney, accompanied by Producer Fiona Hill.

The pair recorded two segments which were broadcast on BBC Radio 4 programme 'Inside Health' in August.

Dr McCartney interviewed Dr Colin Church, a Consultant in the Scottish Pulmonary Vascular Unit who spoke to her about the ongoing work and treatments for Pulmonary Arterial Hypertension – which is high blood pressure in the lungs.

In their second segment they met up with one of our orthopaedic surgeons, Jason Roberts, a multi gold-medal winning cyclist.

Jason spoke to them about our Motion Analysis Lab facilities – and the groundbreaking research currently being carried out there.

Keen cyclist Margaret couldn't resist testing out some of our cutting edge equipment.

Margaret was fitted with a series of sensors, then sat on a static racing bike for our cameras to take a 3D scan of her cycling for a few minutes.

And the results instantly showed areas where there were specific pressure points around Dr McCartney's body.

It's hoped that the information and research gathered in our motion lab will be of specific use to elite athletes in Scotland and beyond – and help give them that winning edge.

Did you know?

Andrew Nelson is just three weeks older than the NHS – the national treasure which saved his life.

Volunteer is 70@70

One of our 70-year-old volunteers and former Ministry of Defence Police Sergeant, Andrew Nelson, suffered a major heart attack, resulting in triple bypass surgery just before his 40th birthday.

However, when his health became steadily worse over the next 10 years, it was apparent that he urgently needed a heart transplant, which the grandfather-of-three, from Helensburgh, received at Glasgow's Royal Infirmary 20 years ago.

Since all adult heart and lung services moved here in 2008, Andrew's care also transferred over. It was then he decided to 'give something back to the NHS' by offering his services as a Peer Support Volunteer.

My birthday is actually three weeks prior to the NHS service starting; if it wasn't for NHSScotland and the marvellous transplant team here, I wouldn't be here today.

"Prior to my heart attack, I'd never been ill and therefore never needed to see a doctor. I was always athletic, had a very demanding job, always on the go and interested in sport and going about my daily duties with absolute ease.

"When I fell ill, the NHS was there for me. They were super efficient, helpful and extremely compassionate and I have nothing but the highest praise for their brilliant staff, and our national service."

Andrew feels to say thank you is just not enough and he now offers his time in delivering invaluable support and advice to transplant patients.

Mark Duddy, 48, a caretaker from Uddingston, received a heart transplant at the Golden Jubilee last winter. He is deeply grateful for his life-saving care, as well as the support and friendship received from Andrew.

Whilst Mark was in the Golden Jubilee National Hospital, Andrew was a regular visitor. Having firsthand knowledge and experience of being on the transplant list, he was able to guide Mark through some difficult times.

Andrew is always there to give you advice and support that just lifts your spirits to keep positive.

"Although your family visit regularly, they really can't appreciate the challenges you are facing on a daily basis because they haven't had a problem with their heart, but Andrew quickly recognises those challenges and immediately supports and guides you over those many hurdles.

"He's been through the same and I'm very grateful he was there for me, especially when I was feeling really down. On the other hand, it's also important for him to see you when you're really happy too.

"I'm very grateful for what the NHS has done for me and can't thank the doctors and all the staff highly enough."

Innovative device remotely monitors heart failure patients

Our cardiologists have recently implanted a new device which remotely monitors heart failure patients as part of the COAST clinical trial.

In a Scottish first, the study will see up to 10 patients receive cardioMEMS implants over two years, with the aim of proving the device is cost-effective to use widely throughout the NHS.

Instead of being hospitalised once every three months to have an invasive procedure performed to measure pressures inside the heart and lungs, the patient just needs to lie on a special pillow for 18 seconds a day, allowing the radio frequency chip inside the device to send vital information remotely to our clinical team.

The implant which is about the size of a paperclip, can detect small changes in pressure in the vessels around the heart before a patient feels any symptoms, allowing the clinical team to change medication doses, potentially reducing hospitalisation.

Heart failure patient Charmaine Bishop was the first in Scotland to receive the cardioMEMS implant as part of the clinical trial.

When specialists diagnosed heart failure, an Implantable Cardioverter Defibrillator was fitted in December 2017. Then in February this year, Charmaine became the first patient to receive the cardioMEMS device when the trial went live.


This new device reduces the need for patients to come into hospital and allows us to monitor them literally from their own bedside no matter where they, or we, are in the world.


Patients benefit from more scans

Around 10,000 more Scots will receive MRI scans every year thanks to our two new Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) machines.

Funded by a £2.4 million allocation from the Scottish Government, the new equipment will reduce waiting times for diagnostics and help meet increasing patient demand.

Over the last six years we have experienced an 88% increase in the number of imaging exams carried out, and MRI is an area that is continually in demand.

This development is the first stage of a three-year expansion of the Golden Jubilee, which will also see ophthalmology, orthopaedic and other services increased.



This direct investment to patient care will not only help us provide NHSScotland with sustainable services for the future, but will allow us to have an even greater impact in diagnosing, treating and monitoring long term health conditions, including heart disease and cancer.

Every year more than four million people across Europe lose their lives due to heart failure. That's why we have joined forces with the University of Glasgow to improve treatment for patients suffering from cardiogenic shock.

Cardiogenic shock following heart failure occurs when your heart suddenly can't pump enough blood to meet your body's needs and oxygenation stops. The condition is most often caused by a severe heart attack. Patients with cardiogenic shock are at extremely high risk of dying, with half of affected patients dying within the first 30 days.

The new study aims to improve outcomes for patients suffering from cardiogenic shock, but to assess the cost effectiveness of this treatment compared to standard treatment, and to use the results of EURO SHOCK to improve the guidelines at all European hospitals.

To prevent cardiogenic shock becoming lethal, EURO SHOCK doctors will assess the early use of a mechanical support device which increases the amount of oxygen in the blood of the patient.

"Preliminary scientific studies have shown that the heart – when suffering a heart attack – can benefit from the support of an extracorporeal mechanical oxygenation machine (ECMO). This machine essentially lends the heart the support it needs to recover. EURO SHOCK doctors hope that this new treatment will help increase life chances of patients with cardiogenic shock.

"As one of the UK's largest heart and lung centres, the involvement of the Golden Jubilee in this study shows that we are ideally placed to ensure that patients in this country continue to be at the forefront of the very latest innovative treatments and the highest standards of care."

10 years, **219** research projects from bench to bedside:

- Pioneering stem cell therapy for patients having a STEMI heart attack.
- Participated in the UK's first gene therapy trials for heart failure patients, called CUPID2 and SERCA2a, taking place in only two hospitals.
- Played a major role in the 'PRAMI trial', finding evidence to suggest that preventative angioplasty following a heart attack has the potential to save the lives of thousands of patients every year.

The gift of life

A former patient made an emotional return to help staff celebrate a very special anniversary.

Georgina Burt, from Falkirk, was the first patient to undergo a heart transplant at the Golden Jubilee National Hospital back in July 2008. She returns every year to personally thank staff who saved her life.

This year it was an extra special occasion, because it's both the 10th anniversary of her transplant and of the Golden Jubilee's Heart and Lung Centre.

To mark this occasion, the first recipient of a life-saving heart transplant was back to greet nursing staff and present them with a plaque and cut the special anniversary cake.

Georgina's transplant was necessary because she had been suffering for a number of years from Cardiomyopathy – a condition which causes the heart muscle to become enlarged, thickened or ridged.

When her condition deteriorated rapidly, she was transferred to the Golden Jubilee Hospital where she was maintained on circulatory support until a suitable heart became available. However, it wasn't

Our Scottish National Advanced Heart Failure Service has proven it is 'all heart' after being presented with a prestigious award by a UK heart failure charity.

The service received the Team of the Year 'You're Marvellous' award from the patient community of the Pumping Marvellous Foundation.

What makes the award win even more special is that the team, and in particular Justin Mulhearn, were commended by a patient who had a Ventricular Assist Device (VAD) implanted as a bridge to heart transplant.

It is, of course, a team effort and credit is also due

Justin was regularly at my bedside to answer my questions and deal with my fears.

"Since my implantation two and a half years ago, the Golden Jubilee team had always been there. Indeed, I have 24/7 access to the whole team at the Golden Jubilee including an emergency VAD line, which I have not yet had to use, thankfully.

"Justin and the team certainly go above and beyond the normal call of duty."

We are honoured to receive this award from the Pumping Marvellous Foundation and would like to thank the patient for taking the time to nominate us.

"This patient's positive experience is testament to the dedication and hard work of the entire heart failure team. A celebration of safety

Ten years after the launch of the Scottish Patient Safety Programme (SPSP), we are holding a week of celebrations to recognise the improvements that have been made in patient care.



What is the SPSP?

The Scottish Patient Safety Programme was the first national approach to patient safety improvement in the world. Many of you will remember that all NHS boards from Scotland gathered in the SECC to hear about new care bundles that we would implement using Quality Improvement methods. By using this new approach would reduce harm and improve quality of care.

SPSP was initially launched with a focus on Acute Adult care. The overarching aim at launch was to reduce hospital mortality by 15% by December 2012 through implementing evidence based care bundles supported by Quality Improvement methods. The initial workstreams focused on the following areas:

- **General Ward** Safety Briefs, situation, background, assessment, recommendation (SBAR) communication, Hand Hygiene, Peripheral Vascular Catheter care.
- Peri-Operative Care normothermia, surgical brief and pause.
- Critical Care Ventilator-associated pneumonia, Central Venous Catheter care and glucose control.
- **Medicines** Medicines reconciliation on admission and discharge.

Underpinning this was Leadership with a focus on Executive Walk Rounds and support to the capacity and capability needed to deliver this work.

The programme has developed over the years with streams focusing on paediatrics, maternity care, mental health to name a few. The focus of the Acute Adult has changed over the years too with current work looking at Pressure Ulcer prevention, prevention of falls and the deteriorating patient.

How does it apply to us here at the Golden Jubilee?

We have been active in SPSP from the very start and implemented the Acute Adult Portfolio across the site with excellent results. We currently have 17 patient areas and 13 theatres which are actively working on SPSP improvements either by testing new ways of reliably doing something or monitoring reliability of an existing safety critical process. Here are some of the amazing achievements:

- Our current VAP days between is 338 days as of mid August.
- Our current CVC related infection days between is 184 days as of mid August.
- Over the last year our average number of falls per month has reduced by five falls per month.

The focus on Pressure Ulcer prevention has achieved amazing results:

- Ward 2 East has gone 526 days without a pressure ulcer.
- Ward 2 West has gone 570 days without a pressure ulcer.
- Wards 2C and 2D have had no reported PU since 2016.

However, the real winners on the evening were the staff in the NHS who showcased their incredible skills by way of promoting their extraordinary stories.







Challenging conditions saw them cycle in temperatures of between minus 2 and 26 degrees as they raised over £1000 for Project GO.


